



## The 1914 – 15 Cracker Jack Card Sets – Confectionary Cardboard Perfection









When German immigrants Frederick & Louis Rueckheim started their confectionary business in 1873, they never could have envisioned that one day their "popcorn and caramel teats in a box" would be synonymous with America's National pastime. A brief timeline of events -

#### Timeline:

- 1873 Frederick Rueckheim migrates to Chicago to help clean up debris from the great *Chicago Fire of 1871*. Frederick goes into business with friend William Brinkmeyer where they operate a popcorn business within Chicago's Loop. Brinkmeyer sells his share of the business to Frederick's younger brother (Louis). Thus, the FW Rueckheim & Bros. confectionary company was born.
- 1874 The original name of the company was *Reliable Confections* with a big red "R" as the trademark.
- 1908 The Cracker Jack Company started adding a toy or novelty for kids in each box. Around this time, the 1<sup>st</sup> baseball related item made its way into the Cracker Jack box: It is a bear.
- 1914 The 1<sup>st</sup> baseball cards are inserted into boxes of this confectionary treat. Because of moisture issues, many of the cards are found to be sticking to the candy thus making the inaugural issues tough to find in decent shape in present day collecting circles.
- 1915 The 2<sup>nd</sup>, and final, baseball card set is showcased by the Rueckheim Bros. in boxes. The 176 card issue is obtainable by remitting coupons (approx. 100) and 10 cents.
- 1922 Reliable Confections officially becomes The Cracker Jack Co.
- 1925 It was during this time period that *The Cracker Jack Co.* discontinued all but two of its phenomenal line of products (*Candy Pulls, Toasted Yum Yums, Hunky Dory Chocolate, Iced Nougats* among many others) all in favor of promoting their (2) biggest sellers: Cracker Jack and Angelus Marshmallows.
- 1964 The historic company is sold to *Borden, Inc.* as a separate entity.
- 1997 The company is once again sold; this time to corporate giant: **Frito Lay** headquartered in Plano, Texas.
- 2010 and beyond High grade PSA *Shoeless Joe Jackson* cards (The most desirable Cracker Jack card) continue to fetch record prices at major auction houses.

## 1952 George "Specs" Toporcer (St. Louis Cardinals) Night Program

1952 George Specs Toporcer Night Program (George Specs Toporcer had a distinguished career with the St. Louis Cardinals that began in 1921. A shortstop by trade, Specs never had a strong throwing arm but was widely regarded by his peers as a "solid middle infielder" who could hit a little. He had his best year in 1922, when he hit .324 with (25) doubles, (56) runs scored and (114) hits in (116) games. After his tenure with the Cardinals ended in 1928, Toporcer was relegated to life in the minor leagues as both a player and a manager. Because of his meritorious service with the Rochester Red Wings, he was given a "Night of His Own" on July 21, 1952 at Red Wing Stadium.
